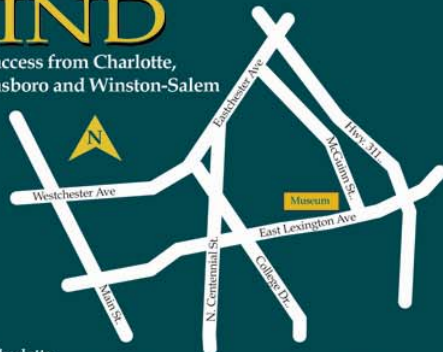

From Charlotte
 Follow I-85 N. Take Exit 111, turning left onto Business US-311 N. Turn right onto S College Dr. After 3 miles, turn right onto East Lexington Ave. The Museum is on your left.

From Greensboro
 Follow I-85 S, merging onto I-85 Business S (Exit 118). Take the Brentwood St./311-N exit, turning right onto 311-N. Take Exit 21 (Greensboro Rd.), turn left. Greensboro Rd. becomes Lexington Ave. The Museum is on your right after crossing McGuinn Ave.

From Winston-Salem
 Follow I-40 E. Merge onto US-311 S via Exit 196. Take Exit 21 and turn right onto Greensboro Rd. Greensboro Rd. becomes Lexington Ave. The Museum is on your right after crossing McGuinn Ave.

Travel through Time in the Historical Park

Step into the home of John Haley and view the lifestyles of a wealthy late 18th century household. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the 1786 Haley House is the oldest home in High Point.

Hear the sounds of a blacksmith at work in the Blacksmith Shop. Outfitted as it would have been in the years John Haley was a practicing blacksmith, live demonstrations can be seen two weekends per month.

See how early American chores such as weaving, candle dipping, open-herth cooking and others were done inside the 1801 log Hoggatt House.

Learn how backcountry women used herbs for treating illnesses, dyeing cloth, deodorizing rooms and repelling bugs in our historic Herb Garden.
